WHEREAS, the department provides duty ammunition for certain other weapons carried by officers, and

WHEREAS, Illinois state law requires that the Quincy Police Department must provide firearms training to all sworn officers at least annually; and

WHEREAS, because of training use and necessary replacement of practice and duty ammunition, the Quincy Police

Department must purchase replacement ammunition annually; and

WHEREAS, the officers must train and qualify with the same caliber ammunition used in the field; and

WHEREAS, Ray O'Herron holds the state bid for the following ammunition:

## APPROVAL OF SPYGLASS SNAPSHOT AUDIT AGREEMENT

WHEREAS, the City has received a proposal from the The SpyGlass Group LLC for the auditing of the City's telecommunications service billing (local and long distance voice billing, internet and data line billing, including wireless billing); and,

WHEREAS, fees for the auditing services are success based fees:

- If SpyGlass does not find anything or the City chooses not to implement anything, there is no cost to the City
- Fees only pertain to the recommendations the City selects
- 30% of Cost Recovery (refunds or credits SpyGlass brings back to the City)
- 10 times any monthly service elimination and cost reduction savings, which ensures that City's ROI will be realized with 10 months of the engagement.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the City Council hereby approves the Agreement (attached "SpyGlass Snapshot Audit Augreement") between the City and SpyGlass Group LLC for auditing of the City's telecommunications service billing.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that City Council authorize the Mayor to sign the agreement on the City's behalf.

## RESOLUTION REAUTHORIZING BET on Q GRANT PROGRAM

WHEREAS, the Quincy City Council established the BET on Q Grant Program in the spring of 2021; and

WHEREAS, the program is funded through revenue generated by the Food & Beverage Tax; and

WHEREAS, the City Council committed \$100,000 per fiscal year to the program in FY21/22, FY22/23, and FY23/24, and committed \$150,000 in FY24/25; and

WHEREAS, the goal of the BET on Q Grant Program is to bring more out-of-town visitors to Quincy to eat in local restaurants, drink in local bars, shop in local stores, and stay in local hotels/motels; and

WHEREAS, individuals or groups can apply for a BET on Q grant to establish a new event in Quincy or to expand an existing event; and

WHEREAS, a total of 28 BET on Q grants have been approved; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to continue to incentive the establishing of new events in Quincy or the expanding of existing events as a way to bring more out-of-town visitors to Quincy.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

- 1) That the Quincy City Council reauthorize the Bring Events to Quincy (BET on Q) Grant Program at the budgeted level of \$150,000 in FY24/25
  - 2) That the funding for BET on Q shall come from Economic Growth Fund 213

Ald. Reis moved for the adoption of the resolution, seconded by Ald. Reed, and on the roll call each of the 13 Aldermen voted yea, with 1 absent. Motion carried.

#### RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING QUINCY LEGACY EVENTS GRANT PROGRAM (LEGUP)

WHEREAS, the Quincy City Council established the BET on Q Grant Program in the spring of 2021 to provide financial support to events that bring more out-of-town visitors to Quincy to eat, drink, shop, and stay locally; and

WHEREAS, individuals or groups can apply for a BET On Q Grant to establish a new event in Quincy or to expand an existing event; and

WHEREAS; after three years, there are community events in Quincy that are no longer eligible for BET on Q funding; and

WHEREAS; the City believes these legacy events still accomplish the goal of bringing out-of-town visitors to Quincy; and

WHEREAS; the City understands the financial challenges involved in putting on events, even those legacy events that have been held for years; and

WHEREAS; the City seeks authorization of the Quincy Legacy Events Grant Program (LEGUP) to help provide financial support to these legacy events; and

WHEREAS; the program will be funded through revenue generated by the Food & Beverage Tax and be managed by the Quincy Convention & Visitors Bureau (CVB); and

WHEREAS; the Quincy CVB will accept and review LEGUP applications and award grants in the amount of \$1,000-\$10,000 to legacy events that bring people to Quincy and improve the local quality of life.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED as follows:

- 1) That the Quincy City Council authorize the Quincy Legacy Events Grant Program (LEGUP) at the budgeted level of \$100,000 in FY24/25
  - 2) That the funding for LEGUP shall come from Economic Growth Fund 213

#### RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, one of the most important pieces of equipment to a firefighter is their firefighting "bunker gear"; and, WHEREAS, bunker gear wears over time and must be replaced on a regular basis per NFPA standards and manufacturer recommendations; and,

WHEREAS, the Quincy Fire Department has nine sets of bunker gear due for replacement this fiscal year and needs three sets for new hires; and,

WHEREAS, quotes (per set) were sought for the needed gear from three different vendors and were submitted as follows:

Municipal Emergency Services (MES) \$3,508.00 AEC Fire Safety & Security, Inc. \$3,625.00 DingesFire \$3,725.00

WHEREAS, the amount for the gear was budgeted in the current fiscal year; and,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Chairman of the Fire Aldermanic Committee and the Fire Chief recommend to the Mayor and City Council that the Fire Chief be authorized to purchase the required thirteen sets of gear for the total amount of \$42,096.00 from Municipal Emergency Services.

WHEREAS, the building is an important City asset, and its location lends itself as the busiest fire district; and,

WHEREAS, the station has had issues with water infiltration and the roof has had patchwork repairs over the years; and,

WHEREAS, two (2) proposals were received and reviewed by the fire department administration; and,

WHEREAS, the proposal from Tournear Roofing Company was the lowest received bid while meeting all specifications; and.

WHEREAS, funding for the replacement of the Central Fire Station roof was incorporated into this fiscal year budget; NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Fire Aldermanic Committee and the Fire Chief recommend to the Mayor and City Council that the proposal from Tournear Roofing Company in the amount of \$188,000.00 be approved.

WHEREAS, based on law, national standards, safety regulations, and developed best industry practices, fire department policies and procedures are ever evolving; and

WHEREAS, with policy failure comes liability; and

WHEREAS, Lexipol is America's leading provider of policy management resources for the fire service; and

WHEREAS, Lexipol provides comprehensive, defensible policies written by legal and public safety professionals; and

WHEREAS, Lexipol's periodic training bulletins bring the manual into practice through real-life; scenario-based training exercises; and

WHEREAS, the Quincy Fire Department is currently working to update all of its policies and procedures into one easily accessible program with training; and

WHEREAS, Lexipol provides a reduced rate for agencies belonging to MICA; and

WHEREAS, Lexipol has a one-time implementation cost of \$27,879.65 and an annual subscription cost of \$12,852.55;

WHEREAS, funding for the purchase of this service was incorporated into this fiscal year budget;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Fire Chief and Fire Aldermanic Committee recommend to the Mayor and City Council that the Fire Chief be authorized to enter the contract with Lexipol LLC. and purchase this service in the amount of \$40,732.20.

WHEREAS, Sentinel Emergency Solutions is the manufacturer's dealer for this area, so this is a sole source service; and

WHEREAS, Sentinel Emergency Solutions provides the scheduled maintenance and air sampling for the two compressors utilized for the refilling of SCBA air bottles; and,

WHEREAS, the fire department includes this annual service and maintenance in its budget; and,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that the Fire Chief and Fire Aldermanic Committee recommend to the Mayor and City Council that the Fire Chief be authorized to pay the amount of \$7,540.00 to Sentinel Emergency Solutions, St. Louis MO.
